

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENT

RULES & INFORMATION

ELIGIBILITY:

Divisions are open to individuals, chapters or clubs located in Tuolumne County. Individuals, chapters or clubs located in Calaveras or Mariposa Counties will be allowed to show only in divisions where their county fairs have reciprocal agreements for showing. In some cases that will restrict entries to breeding classes only. Individual chapters or clubs located in Stanislaus County will be allowed to show in breeding classes only, as space allows.

EXHIBITOR AGE REQUIREMENTS:

- **FFA** members may participate as members until the end of the calendar year following the year of graduation from high school. (For example, a graduate this year is eligible until December 31st of next year).
- **4-H** members must be at least 9 years old or enrolled in 4th grade on January 1, 2009 to exhibit in the Junior Livestock Department. For home-schooled youth, only the age criteria applies. 4-H exhibitors are eligible to compete/exhibit through December 31 of the year in which they turn 19 years of age. 4-H Primary members may not be helpers in 4-H classes.
- **Grange** members must be 9 years old on January 1, 2009 to exhibit livestock. They may exhibit until the end of the calendar year in which they reach age 19.
- **Independent** exhibitors must be at least 9 years old or in the 4th Grade by January 1, 2009. Exhibitors are eligible to compete/exhibit through December 31 of the year in which they turn 19 years of age.
- Independent and Grange junior exhibitors up through 8th grade will show in the appropriate 4-H Division. Independent and Grange junior exhibitors 9th grade and up will show in the appropriate FFA Division.

RULES & INFORMATION:

1. State and Local Rules apply to all entries.
2. Entries must be made on Livestock entry forms provided by the fair.
3. With this entry form each 4-H & Independent exhibitors must provide the Fair proof of liability insurance coverage or purchase insurance through the fair office \$35 for large livestock and \$18 for small livestock. This insurance requirement also applies to members of any organization that does not provide liability insurance to their members. County, District and State Fairs cannot legally carry liability insurance covering Junior exhibitors and/or their exhibits. Liability insurance is the responsibility of the Junior Exhibitor.
4. Separate entry forms must be used for each specie of animal.
5. The official show uniform is to be worn by all Junior Livestock Exhibitors while showing at the Mother Lode Fair. The uniform consists of white or dark blue denim trousers or skirts and white button front shirt (long or short sleeve), shirt tucked in. Additional garments shall be worn to designate 4-H, FFA and Grange affiliation in accordance with rules provided by those organizations. No flip flops, sandals or any open toed shoes are to be worn by a livestock exhibitor in the livestock area.

6. 4-H, FFA, Grange and independent junior classes will be combined. Showmanship and Market classes may be offered for separate groups regardless of the competition. Each entry in these Divisions shall have been made or produced by exhibitor.
7. All Livestock exhibitors must enter showmanship with each specie exhibited or exhibitor will be eliminated from market and breeding classes with that specie. Animals dismissed from showmanship classes will not be disqualified from showing in breeding and/or market classes.
8. Animal Health Exam: It shall be the duty of each exhibitor to see that his or her animal(s) pass the health examination before being checked-in. Such examination to be conducted by Livestock team member(s) appointed by the Livestock Superintendent. The exhibitor or their representative must be present during the examination. All sheep will be flipped. **Tail Docking:** As per 2009 State Rules for California Fairs page 20 Sheep A. "To qualify for exhibit market lambs must be docked such that the tail (dock) is healed and can be lifted from the exterior. Lambs that have no tail dock will not be eligible."
9. Fair authorized weight slips will be processed during weigh-in for market animals. It shall be the duty of each exhibitor to check his or her entries for weight classification prior to judging.
10. One (1) re-weigh will be allowed upon request. Animal will be removed from the scales and scales re-balanced. Animal will immediately be placed on scales and weighed. At no time will the animal leave the scale area.
11. A market animal not meeting minimum weight requirements will be re-classified to a feeder class.
12. Fitting and Grooming: While on the fairgrounds, not only during the fair, all Livestock exhibitors will care for their own animals, pens, bedding and exhibits. Adults may supervise only. Adults or non-exhibitors are specifically prohibited from fitting, grooming or showing the project animal(s). Exhibitors may be assisted by adults in the movement of project animals to and from pens, scales, show rings, and auction rings. An exhibitor is allowed assistance with grooming and fitting from other eligible Mother Lode Fair Junior Livestock Exhibitors. If a violation is reported, fair management reserves the right to determine the degree of the offense which may result in disciplinary action by the fair, which could include removal of the offender from the grounds, withholding awards and/or disqualifying the exhibitor. Adult assistance in saddling and bridling horses is permitted.
13. Exhibitors will not use abusive or questionable techniques in feeding, fitting, and showing their animals, including, but not limited to, the application of rings or decorations. Any animals displaying rings or decorations will be excused from competition and removed from the fairgrounds. Only traditional tatoos, brands and ear tags for identification purposes will be allowed.
14. Exhibitors or clubs may not paint pens.
15. The State Fire Marshall prohibits the following:
 - No electrical cords are permitted on or under the ground in the barns or barn area.
 - No overhead watering is permitted.
16. Livestock Project Displays: **All displays must be identified by Club, Chapter, and exhibitors' name.**
 - Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goats (any) - one (1) hanging display per group. No pens will be used for display.
 - Horse - one (1) display on outside wall of the horse barn adjacent to stall assignment. After entries close, any remaining stalls will be assigned for the use of displays and/or tack.
17. Judging Definitions:
 - American The judging process to rank exhibits against one another and awarding one first place, one second place, etc.

- Danish The judging process to compare each exhibit on its own merit against the scorecard or recognized standard and award as many first, second and third, etc. placings as merited.

18. Special Awards and trophies are listed separately beginning on **page 42**.

19. Exhibitors with breeding project animals entered in the Fair are allowed to display a sign with the name of **their business** that produced the entry. No soliciting sales of materials, services or livestock by adults or non-exhibitors (no "For Sale" signs or business cards).

20. The Fair expects the following requirements to be adhered to by each Livestock exhibitor. Failing to do so will disqualify the exhibitor from participating at the Fair as well as the Junior Livestock Auction and/or Small Livestock Auction and the animal will be removed from the Fair.

- Meetings - 4-H Exhibitor will adhere to any meetings required by their 4-H project or club leaders. FFA Exhibitor will adhere to any meetings required by their FFA advisors or instructors. Grange members will adhere to any meetings required by their Grange youth advisor. Independent Junior Exhibitors are required to attend a meeting set by Fair (time and location to be announced); exhibitor is required to have their parent or guardian in attendance. All exhibitors are expected to attend the Junior Livestock Exhibitors' information meeting scheduled for Wednesday, June 24 at 1:30 p.m. Livestock exhibitors will be held accountable for information presented at the June 24 meeting.
- Record Books - All exhibitors are required to have their project record book available beginning Wednesday, weigh-in day and throughout the four days of the Fair.
- Project Summary Sheet - Each market animal exhibitor must complete the project summary sheet found on back pages. The completed sheet must be submitted to the livestock office by Friday, June 26, 2009 at 5:00 p.m.
- Exhibitors of market animals must be present for pre-weigh and weigh-in to be eligible to show and sell. Exceptions must be requested in writing and have prior approval before weigh-ins to the Mother Lode Fair, 220 Southgate Drive, Sonora.
- Livestock exhibitors must show their own animal in all market classes. Exceptions will be granted for emergencies and severe health issues only. Exhibitors actively showing more than one entry in a breeding class are allowed to have assistance from other exhibitors.
- Supervision - All exhibitors must be under the on-grounds supervision of a parent/legal guardian, adult club/project leader, or advisor/instructor as determined by exhibitor's affiliation status while caring for or showing animals at the Fair. **Independent junior exhibitors will be supervised by a parent/guardian at all times when exhibitor is in livestock area.**
- Barn Duty - All exhibitors must fulfill assigned barn duty. 4-H exhibitors will be assigned barn duty by their project leader. FFA exhibitors will be assigned barn duty by their FFA advisor or instructor. Grange exhibitors will be assigned barn duty by their youth advisor. Independent exhibitors are responsible for their own barn duty at all times.

21. Animals must be fed and watered each day of the Fair by 8:00 a.m.

22. Pens must be cleaned before 10:00 a.m. each day of the fair.

23. Anyone entering the fair to feed or water must have a 2009 Mother Lode Fair wristwrap on their wrist.

24. All vehicles entering the fair to feed must have a parking permit or vehicle permit. Vehicle permits will be issued to feed for 20

minutes before 8:00 a.m. each day of the Fair . Each passenger in the vehicle must be wearing a wristwrap or display a daily admission stamp. Any vehicles remaining past the **8:00 a.m.** time limit will be towed at the owners expense.

25. **WRISTWRAPS AND PARKING PERMITS:** To reserve wristwraps and preferred parking permits fill out the request form located in the back pages of the exhibitor handbook and return to the Fair office with the exhibitors Livestock entry form and full payment. Wristwraps and parking permits will be labeled with the family name and waiting to be picked up at “will call” in the Fair office June 15 through June 19, 2009.
26. Each Livestock exhibitor will receive (1) one wristwrap at no charge for their use only. Exhibitors must wear the designated wristwrap **at all times** during the fair. Livestock Exhibitor’s family members (i.e. parents or legal guardians, plus brothers and sisters under the age of eighteen (18)) may reserve wristwraps for \$30.00 per person and will be limited to these family members listed. Wristwraps purchased after June 19, 2009 will be sold at **\$35.00** per wristwrap. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**
27. On grounds four-day preferred parking permits can be reserved for \$30.00 each (one per livestock family). There is a limited number available. Again to reserve a parking space, fill out and return the request form located in the back pages of the Exhibitor Handbook. Turn it into the Fair office with the exhibitors livestock entry form and full payment.
28. Stock trailers must be parked off the fairgrounds.
29. No dogs allowed on the fairgrounds, except service dogs for the disabled.

LARGE LIVESTOCK RULES

1. Pen assignments will be posted by 12:00 noon, Monday, June 22, 2009 outside of the Livestock Office.
2. No breeder I.D. tags will be allowed on Market animals.
3. Swine Exhibitors must provide Likits. Likits to be in place Tuesday p.m., June 23, 2009. Likits **cannot be removed** until Monday, June 29, 2009 beginning at 6:00 a.m.
4. All Swine Exhibitors must provide a pallet for their pen.
5. No tack or displays to be brought in before 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday, June 23, 2009.
6. Exhibitors are limited to a total of one (1) market animal entry in beef, sheep and swine divisions combined.
7. Horses with stall reservations must be in stalls by 12:00 noon, Wednesday, June 24, 2009. Empty stalls will be reassigned after that time. Horses must be in stalls by 10:00 a.m. each morning of the fair.
8. Pens must be clean by Monday, June 29, 2009 by 12:00 noon. This includes the removal of all posters, wooden hog pallets, mesh panels, indoor/outdoor carpet etc.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK AUCTION

1. The following junior exhibitors may sell at the Tuolumne County Junior Livestock Auction: Tuolumne County residents showing as members of Tuolumne County FFA Chapters, members of Tuolumne County 4-H Clubs, members of Tuolumne County Grange and independent exhibitors residing in Tuolumne County as defined in previous rules. All market beef, sheep and swine pre-weighed, and entered by junior exhibitors, meeting weight requirements and declared eligible through judging shall be subject for sale in the Junior Livestock Auction. All eligible animals shall be selected for sale order by the sale committee.
2. Only hogs grading Market Acceptable will sell through the sale.
3. Only lambs and beef grading Market Ready will sell through the sale.
4. An exhibitor may not sell more than one animal at the Junior Livestock Auction.
5. Sale order will be announced the day of sale.
6. There will be no upper weight limit as a condition of the sale for beef or sheep, however the **maximum weight limit for swine as a condition of the sale is 295 pounds**. The minimum weights and maximum price paid per pound will be set at the following limits:
 - Beef - minimum 1,000 lbs., paid to 1,300 lbs.
 - Sheep - minimum 100 lbs., paid to 150 lbs.
 - Swine - minimum 215 lbs., **maximum 295 lbs.**, paid to 275 lbs.
7. In accordance with State Rules and Regulations of the Division of Fairs and Expositions, the Mother Lode Fair will withhold 5% on the purchase price of each animal sold in the auction. This is to cover the disappearance or death of an animal or other discrepancies that may occur and to offset auction expenses.
8. Beef Legislation check-off of \$1 per head sold at auction will be levied for the Beef Council.
9. Pork Promotion check-off is (.0040) of the gross market value and will be levied for the National Pork Board.
10. Project Record Books and Project Summary Sheets must accompany the livestock consigned for sale at the auction and be available for review by the Livestock Auction Committee at anytime during the fair. The project summary sheet is found on the back pages of this book and must be submitted to the livestock office by Friday, June 26, 2009 at 5:00 p.m.
11. Exhibitors of market animals must be present for pre-weigh and weigh-in to be eligible to show and sell. Exceptions must be requested in writing and have prior approval before weigh-ins to the Mother Lode Fair, 200 Southgate Drive, Sonora.
12. Livestock exhibitors must show their own animal in all market classes. Exceptions will be granted for emergencies and severe health issues only. Exhibitors actively showing more than one entry in a breeding class are allowed to have assistance from other exhibitors.
13. Feeding and care of the livestock sold at auction remains the responsibility of the Exhibitor up until the time the animals are loaded in trucks for shipment.
14. Paint Branding: All auction animals must be clean, dry, in pens, and sheep blankets removed by 8:00 a.m. Saturday, June 27, 2009.
15. An executive committee consisting of one (1) FFA advisor, one (1) 4-H leader and the Chairman of the Junior Livestock Auction Committee will be responsible for the enforcement of the rules governing the sale. The Executive Committee will decide who sells at the auction. Selling at the Junior Livestock Auction is not a guarantee, but a privilege. Unacceptable behavior by an exhibitor could

jeopardize the exhibitor's ability to sell.

16. Market animals will be processed by licensed processors. (Section 357-359 of California Agricultural Code). No live pick up will be permitted.
17. Livestock Superintendent is authorized to stop the sale of wild or sick livestock.
18. Each lot sold through the Junior Livestock Auction will be assessed (\$15) to cover the cost of a buyers ticket and will be deducted from the exhibitor's auction check.
19. Add-ons or bumps will not be recognized at the auction.
20. Exhibitors giving buyers gift baskets or presents will not be allowed to do so within the sale ring. Gift baskets may be presented in the bleacher area. The auctioneer is prohibited from reading promotional speeches from the exhibitor.
21. Animals not qualifying for the auction may be sold at private treaty. Advertisements and negotiations may take place after the Junior Livestock Auction has ended. Animals sold at private treaty may not be shipped with auction animals.
22. Auction animals that are declared unfit at the processing plant may become the full financial responsibility of the seller.
23. In the event an animal dies, the contingency fund will reimburse the buyer at the current market price as determined by the appropriate processing plant at the time of sale.
24. Additional rules may be added prior to the sale and will be posted at the Livestock office.

DRUG STATEMENT:

NEW! Sale checks will be mailed after processing, after the fair has received a thank you letter, stamped and addressed to the buyer of their animal. Seller acknowledges the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act prohibits the introduction or delivery into interstate commerce of any food that is adulterated or misbranded. Adulteration includes poisonous or deleterious substances, and new animal drugs defined as unsafe within the meaning of Section 512 (21 USC Section 260b) of that act and those drugs listed in Section 404 (21 USC Section 342).

- Seller is responsible for animals that are rejected at processing center due to the presence of drug residues.
- Seller shall report to management any and all drugs or medications administered to an animal that might still be detected at time of showing and the name of the drug, its purpose, time and date of administration. This must be done prior to showing animal.
- Seller is responsible for any fees that arise from the processor caring for animal while waiting the specified time to process the use of drugs. If the processor refuses care of the animal for the time specified for the drug used, the seller must care for the animal and make the appropriate arrangements with the buyer and the processor.
- See use of pharmaceuticals in market animals in the 2009 State Rules for California Fairs, page 23, #9.
- Additional rules will be provided as needed prior to the sale.

NOTES TO LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR PARENTS

- All adults intending to help move animals to and from pens, showrings and washracks must wear appropriate shoes (no sandals, flip flops or open toed shoes). Parents are responsible to assist with their exhibitors animal's photo session.
- No carry-in alcohol is allowed at the 2009 Mother Lode Fair. All tack, bags and ice chests will be inspected. Anyone found with alcohol will be escorted from the Fair and will not be allowed readmittance.
- Proof of insurance or funds to cover the cost of insurance is required for all Independent or 4-H Livestock Exhibitors. Cost per family is \$35.00 large livestock and \$18.00 small livestock. Proof or payment must accompany all livestock or horse show entry forms. Entry forms will not be accepted without this insurance requirement being met.
- Checks for animals sold at the Mother Lode Fair Junior Livestock Auction will be held by the Fair until the carcasses are released from the processors. The Fair will mail checks to the exhibitors at that time as long as the Fair has received the appropriate thank you letter, stamped and addressed to the buyer of their animal. Thank you letters will be accepted at the livestock office as soon as Sunday, June 28.
Please note: Exhibitors name must be written on the backside of the envelope.
- The Mother Lode Fair is governed by 2009 State Rules for California Fairs. State Rules are available at the Fair office. The Fair stands behind those rules, and as a reminder please review the following:

page 23,

9. Use of Pharmaceuticals in Market Animals:

1. Signature on entry form signifies compliance with all manufacturer and veterinarian pharmaceutical, biologic and chemical instructions and withdrawal regulations, and that all off-label treatments to market animals have been administered lawfully in accordance with a prescription from a California-licensed veterinarian, whose statement under penalty or perjury notes dosage, date, and purpose for administration.
2. All exhibitors must advise management of any drugs and medications administered to an animal that might still be detected at the time of showing or at meat inspection. The name of the drug, its purpose, withdrawal time, route, time and date of administration must be presented to management prior to the showing or sale of the animal. Livestock treated within the specified withdrawal period cannot be sold without notifying the buyer.
3. Exhibitors must complete the fair's medication certificate prior to sale.

10. Sellers are responsible for animals that are condemned or rejected at processing centers.

- The Fair will hold the exhibitor financially responsible for any condemned or rejected carcass.

MOTHER LODE FAIR HORSE SHOW

American System of Judging

GENERAL INFORMATION:

1. This Horse Show is governed by commonly recognized equestrian rules AND the Gymkhana is governed by CGA (California Gymkhana Association) Rules.
2. The judge's decision is final and cannot be protested. Protests shall be based on violations of the Mother Lode Fair Horse Show Rules.
3. Open to eligible 4-H, FFA, Grange and any youth meeting age requirements and residing in Tuolumne, Calaveras, Mariposa and Stanislaus Counties.
4. First place winners of all classes except walk-trot classes shall qualify to enter the 2008 California State Fair Best of Show Horse Show. See www.bigfun.org for details.
5. Entry fees are not refundable. **No post entries.**
6. Exhibitors entered as members of 4-H, FFA and Grange must be in good standing with their organization and be enrolled in projects under the supervision of that organization.
7. 4-H, FFA and Grange Horse Project exhibitors must own the horse they enter or have leased the horse, for a minimum of 120 days prior to June 14, 2009. A leased horse cannot be shown for conformation. 4-H, FFA and Grange exhibitors must file a copy of the horse lease with the 4-H office, FFA advisor or Grange youth advisor at least 120 days prior to the horse show date. For owned horses, proof of ownership must be available at check in. Independent exhibitors must provide proof of ownership (120 days prior to the horse show) for showmanship and conformation classes.
8. Entry in Showmanship is required if exhibitor wishes to enter a conformation class.
9. Exhibitors reserving stalls may stable their horses at the fairgrounds as space permits on Wednesday, June 24, 2009. Priority for stall assignments will be given to Outstanding Exhibitor applicants. Tack stalls may be available after horse stalls have been assigned.
10. Junior 4-H members are age 9 or in 4th grade up to age 13 as of January 1, 2009, riding classes only, not showmanship.
11. Senior 4-H members are age 14 - 18 years old as of January 1, 2009, riding classes only, not showmanship.
12. Yearling is an animal born during 2008.
13. Pony is less than 14.2 hands (58 inches) in height.
14. A limited area will be provided for warm-up.
15. The Fair will make showmanship patterns available to the exhibitors prior to the class.
16. Any changes in rules shall be posted at the Entry Table at the beginning of the show.

4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent Uniform Requirements:

1. The official show uniform must be worn during showmanship classes. It consists of white or dark blue denim trousers and white long sleeved shirt. Additional garments shall be worn to designate 4-H, FFA and Grange affiliation in accordance with rules provided by those organizations.
2. Western or English riding apparel or the appropriate uniform for 4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent Junior exhibitors must be worn for this show.
3. All exhibitors must wear riding boots. No hiking boots or tennis shoes allowed.

HORSE SHOW RULES:

1. An equestrian helmet with fastened chin strap, meeting ASTM/SEI approval will be required for all riding events. No exceptions.
2. All exhibitors must be accompanied by a parent, legal guardian or adult club or chapter leader.
3. Each entrant will provide all necessary equipment and horse or pony to compete in this competition. Appropriate tack must be used.
4. Horses should not be left unattended for any reason.
5. Any changes in the Horse Show scheduling will be announced at the Horse Show area on the day of the show. Such announcements shall be deemed sufficient notice to exhibitors.
6. If any exhibitor leaves the arena for any reason, that exhibitor cannot return to the class.
7. Exhibitors must declare any medications given their horses when they check in.
8. Substitutions are permitted only in cases of illness or injury of animal with a Veterinarian's Certificate. The substitute must be the member's project animal.
9. The judge may disqualify any animal that is not sufficiently gentle to be shown with safety. All animals in the Horse Show must be serviceably sound.
10. Exhibitors entering trail classes will be limited to three (3) refusals per obstacle. After the third refusal the exhibitor will be excused from the class with a no score.
